The Golden Jubilee of Oueen Elizabeth II was celebrated in Pettistree on Sunday June 2nd 2002. Every resident and those who attend Pettistree Church had a personal invitation to a Tea Party on the front lawn of "The Laurels" by kind permission of Jeff and Maggie Hallett. Every household was asked to bring a plate of either sweet or savoury food. One hundred and twenty three people attended.

An exhibition was held in the garage telling how past royal events i.e. jubilees and coronations were celebrated, going back one hundred and twenty five years to the Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria in 1877. This was researched by Joan Peck, helped by Mary Garner and Maureen Stollery.

Further excitement was provided by the traditional game of quoits, as well as a fancy dress competition "The 1950's" for adults and "Royalty" for children. Whilst a most enjoyable interlude was provided by the Pettistree Orpheans trained by Rita Smith.

The whole afternoon was M.C'd by Tony Franklin while Cath Caudwell captured it all on video for posterity.

Golden Jubilee Celebrations

Golden Jubilee Tea Party at Our house!

The report for the press stated that

'The small village of Pettistree near Wickham Market has once again celebrated a Royal event in style. There are detailed records from the last century of how the community marked Queen Victoria's jubilee celebrations and although the committee did not feel they could copy those lavish affairs of meals and sports events, plans were made in March to celebrate Queen Elizabeth the Seconds Golden Jubilee with a Village Tea Party.'

Those plans were made at a meeting in the Hallett's kitchen and for one reason and another the decision was made that the most central space in the village with electricity, water (and facilities!) and cover available in the event of rain, was "The Laurels" front lawn. In the event we were very lucky with the weather both for the setting up and for the actual tea party.

The best part of having a party in one's garden in Pettistree is knowing that there are a large group of people who will help on the day. The downside is the need of one's husband to have the garden looking immaculate and even the garage vacuumed! I did become quite anxious as the weekend drew near as it proved difficult to confirm who would do what on the day. Luckily both the Johns who help us in the garden responded magnificently to Jeff's need for perfection. On Sunday morning (true to village form) Maureen Stollery arrived promptly at 10.00 and soon others appeared as did tables and chairs from the village hall, bunting and cups and saucers. The bunting was attached to various places (Nigel Holland's extra inches proved useful) and we discovered that the front of the house looks very grand when decorated by a large Union Flag.

I was not one of those who created the wonderful array of food that was piled onto the tables under the walnut tree as Jeff and I decided that individual jellies were a must for a Jubilee tea. This meant that a large part of the previous afternoon had been spent (mostly by Susie) boiling kettles and standing trays of jellies on all the fridge shelves. However I did acquire a cake! This was an impressive looking cake topped by a picture of the Union Jack, but it was even more spectacular when sliced as the layers of sponge were red, white and blue!! It is true to say that no one present had ever seen a cake like it before, and it had the interesting side effect of turning the tongues of those who ate it dark blue!

I managed to get this cake on the previous Friday when I had broken a tooth, which always happens at inconvenient times, and so drive into Ipswich to the dentist. While driving home listening to Radio Suffolk the presenter announced that a celebration cake had been donated by the Cottage Bakery of Nacton Road. To obtain it they were asking people to telephone in to say why their event deserved such a cake. I stopped the car just outside Playford, used the mobile and in a slightly lopsided voice (because of the numb side to my face) gave my reasons for Pettistree having the cake for our celebrations. They telephoned back to ask us to collect our winning cake by 5.00 pm, which Susie did, and we were pleased that this meant we were able to offer three celebration cakes, Margaret Holland's rich Fruit cake, Liisa Beagley's wonderfully gooey Chocolate and Nacton Bakeries highly coloured Sponge.

JELLY & KATE

Launch of a new shop in the area:

Jelly & Kate is a new furniture and giftware shop overlooking the Square in Wickham Market. The owners, Katie Raper (Kate) and her mother Angela Norton (Jelly) were both born and bred in Yorkshire and whilst Jelly, for now, is still living in Yorkshire Katie is a recent 'import' to Suffolk!

Katie (30) moved with her husband Paul to Pettistree two years ago. Both had worked in London for seven years - since leaving Newcastle University where they met - and whilst Paul still commutes daily to his job in the City, Katie decided to leave her job as an Events Manager in London to 'go it alone in the country'. As Yorkshire was a little too far for Paul to commute from each day, they settled for the rural bliss of Suffolk when deciding to move out of London!

Having swapped a two bedroomed flat in Putney for 'Home Farm', Katie's first task was to hunt for affordable furnishings for the house. These she found on trips to furniture auctions with her mother in Yorkshire, where the prices of rustic and junk style furniture were too affordable to be missed! After stripping, waxing, occasionally repairing and often re-painting various items, both Jelly and Kate felt that the finished pieces were good enough to be sold on, and thus the idea for the shop was born.

After several successful furniture sales from the barn at Home Farm Jelly undertook the sourcing and transportation of furniture (in the small family horsebox) from Yorkshire to Suffolk, and took charge of the accounts. Katie meanwhile attended a furniture painting course in Bury St Edmunds and a Princes Trust course on Setting Up Your Own Business, in Ipswich. A business plan was completed and approved by the bank at the start of this year, as a premises was found in Wickham Market – No. 46 The Crafers - and the shop was opened at the end of May 2002. The premises provides a delightful setting in the downstairs room of an old Suffolk house in Wickham Market, the front door to which is conveniently shared with the Teapot tea shop next door. Through the main room of the shop is a second room which J&K are now expanding into by running Furniture Painting courses and workshops, (to begin in September 2002.) Keep your eyes posted in the shop for the commencement dates of these 1 day courses or call the shop on 01728 748 370 for further details. The second room also provides invaluable space from which bespoke items of furniture can be painted, on request, for individual customer The shop provides its audience with country style furniture along with other accessories and items for the home, from garden hammocks to picture frames, lamps, cushions and candlesticks.

Both Jelly and Kate wanted to offer customers more than just furniture and wanted to create a 'lifestyle' outlet in Wickham Market, inspired by its rural countryside environment, which could also be visited for birthday, wedding and Christmas presents, or for purchases for customers themselves and their own homes. Whilst products are now already imported not just from Yorkshire but from as far away as France more suppliers are being brought in from local areas such as Jo Lal's ceramics (Parham) and bath salts supplied by Amanda Soden (of Benhall.)

The style of the shop is definitely influenced by the time Katie spent working in the events department at Country Living magazine and many of the shops' suppliers are regular exhibitors at the Country Living fairs, held twice annually in London. However whilst a key aim is to reflect (through the merchandise) the rustic simplicity of the surrounding Suffolk countryside Jelly & Kate also endeavours to mix older items with other more contemporary objects to meet the needs of a broader audience.

"My daily commute is now along the country lanes and footpaths between Pettistree and Wickham Market" explains Katie " and I'm definitely not in a hurry to swap it for any other!" Katie Raper

Falconry

Having been asked to write about Falconry I thought to myself how could I best use the space available. I decided therefore to give guidance to anybody who feels they would like to take up the sport. Firstly it should be understood that the aim of Falconry is to bring to the surface the natural hunting ability of the chosen hawk and take wild quarry, any other motivation for having birds of prey should not be considered as they are not pets.

Once the commitment has been made it is essential to ensure that there is land available to you over which you can train and hunt the hawk, this will then lead you to the quarry at which you can fly.

At this stage it is best to contact a club or Falconry centre who will be able to advise on the best suited hawk for your needs and hopefully put you in contact with a local Falconer who can advise you on all the aspects of training and housing the hawk.

Many books are available from which an insight into the training, housing and well being of the hawk can be found and give a good foundation to the skills which will be required.

I cannot stress enough that the well being of the hawk is of the utmost importance at all times, and with the pressure that all types of hunting are under these days your conduct in this area and in the field needs to be exemplary.

Once all the required skills have been learned Falconry will be found to be a highly exhilarating sport within which you can make many friends and see some wonderful countryside. But above all, once your hawk is fully trained and fit, you will see one of natures finest hunters doing what she intended and be able to see first hand the techniques by which the quarry evades capture.

A COMMUNITY ACTION PLAN FOR PETTISTREE & LOUDHAM

Your Parish Council has been talking with Suffolk ACRE (an organisation dedicated to helping rural communities), about the development of a Community Action Plan for our village. With their help, we will be starting the process during this coming autumn.

A Community Action Plan will be the result of an extensive programme of work by members of the whole community. The process can be initiated by anyone in the community such as the Parish Council, the Parochial Church Council, or a group of individuals. The most important issue is that is reflects the aspirations and concerns of the community in general.

The Plan will seek to identify what the community believes should happen to improve the economic, social and environmental well being of the people and the Village. It should be noted that both the County and District Councils have recently been given new powers to spend money where it can promote the well being of the community; they both encourage communities to develop Community Plans which will assist them in determining their own priorities for the locality. Local projects are more likely to be funded from the County and District Councils when supported by the community as a result of an appraisal of needs.

The Action Plan is likely to cover a wide range of issues relevant to the Village. It could involve issues such as transport, shops, businesses, housing, the needs of the young and the elderly, conservation and the protection of the environment, schools, crime (and fear of crime), social and recreational activities, open spaces, etc.

It will identify possible sources of funding for the projects it seeks to promote and the preferred timescale within which to achieve those projects.

The preparation of a Community Action Plan is becoming increasingly important. It is not only a valuable opportunity for the community to play an active part in determining its own future, but will also inform other organisations of the community's needs and aspirations. It will help with the development of planning documents such as The Policing Plan, The Local Transport Plan, the District Council's Local Plan, Local Health Strategies, Care in the Community, and many more.

Some of the main reasons for undertaking a Village Appraisal and the development of a Community Action Plan as stated by Suffolk ACRE are: -

	Gives everyone the chance to have their say on local issues, "unlocking ideas".
Ш	Fosters community spirit through people working together.
	Allows local people to learn about their community, to identify potential threats and to take ac-
	tion.
	Helps people understand and meet the challenge of the issues that lie behind sustainable life.
	Results of the survey will form the basis for local action endorsed by the wider community.
П	Identifies opportunities for new community initiatives such as opening a community shop, local environmental projects, or initiatives to develop the local economy.
	Provides a well-informed basis for future Parish Council decisions.
H	Informs the statutory authorities and other decision makers about the community's needs, so they are better able to make informed decisions.
	Produces evidence to influence decision makers by providing the facts, figures and local opinions for campaigning on local issues such as the threat to local services, cuts in bus services or the need for more low cost homes.
	Provides an agreed plan for a community to work to.

The development of a meaningful Plan by and for the community will take time, considerable effort

and a small amount of money.

It will need a group of people associated with the community to act as the focus for all activity. Specialist advisers can supplement that group as and when needed. In the early stages we will use the help and support of Suffolk ACRE; they have already attended a Parish Council meeting to explain the various stages in developing the Plan.

The main stages in developing a Community Action Plan include the following: -

Appraisal Stage

- Gain support
- > Hold a public meeting
- Establish a steering group
- > Identify the aims of the Community Action Plan
- > Funding the development of the Plan
- Consult and gather information
- > Analyse the results of consultation
- > Prepare a report on the findings

Action Planning Stage

- > Identify groups to develop particular issues arising from the village appraisal
- Involve the wider community through public meetings, exhibitions etc
- > Prepare the Action Plan, identifying desired outcomes with time-scales and resource needs

Experience elsewhere suggests that all of this could take at least 12 months and probably more.

The Parish Council is happy to lead the process but will be looking for help from anyone in the village. We will be holding a village meeting in the autumn to explain more and in the meantime we would be pleased to hear from anyone wishing to get involved.
