# Pettistree Parish Council Report by Tony Franklin Chairman

#### Best kept Village Competition

It is now 10 years since the Village entered the competition which is held every other year for villages of less than 400 inhabitants. For each year the Village is eligible the Parish Council considers on behalf of the Village whether we should enter the competition. At its meeting on 5<sup>th</sup> February the Council decided that it was time we entered the competition again in 2007. Jeff Hallett has kindly volunteered his services coordinating the Pettistree entry for this time.

#### **Local Elections**

This year the local elections will include Pettistree and as a consequence all seven seats on the Parish Council will be up for re-election. The election will take place on Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2007 and anyone wishing to be nominated should contact our Parish Council Clerk, Heather Heelis for preliminary information and the Returning Officer at Suffolk Coastal District Council for detailed information and the necessary nomination papers. If you wish to offer yourself for election then the deadline for nominations is noon on 4<sup>th</sup> April 2007.

#### Meetings

May is an important month for local government parish meetings. The Parish Council has set two meeting dates in May, the first being the Annual Parish Council meeting which will take place on 15<sup>th</sup> May. At this meeting the newly elected members of the Parish Council will make their declarations of office and elect a new Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

The second meeting is the Parish Meeting which will take place on Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> May. This meeting is for all people in the village who may place on the agenda any topics which they wish to have discussed. Motions may be proposed and voted upon and if passed they will then provide guidance to the Parish Council when it is deciding on matters affecting the village.

This meeting is an important opportunity for debate within the village and this year the Parish Plan will be the first item on the agenda.

#### The Greyhound Inn

Since the last issue of the Pettistree People, the Parish Council has received no further reliable or attributable information about the future of the Greyhound.

Allegedly, there is an individual who is keen to buy and reopen the Greyhound, however, we are not able to identify that person and nor do we have knowledge of what stage the sales negotiation has reached.

Concern within the Village has continued to grow and at it's meeting on 5<sup>th</sup> February the Parish Council received a letter of concern from a group of residents. That letter suggested that the Parish Council may wish to consider initiating action under the Town and County Planning Act in relation to the upkeep of listed buildings.

Although sympathetic to this suggestion the Council did not feel that it was either knowledgeable enough or sufficiently empowered to take any such action. However, it was decided that the Council should seek advice on taking action from the Director of Planning at Suffolk Coastal.

#### Postwatch

The Parish Council receives many requests for responses to government public consultation exercises. One recently received was concerning the rationalisation of Post Offices. The Council tries to respond to as many of such request as it can and on this occasion it decided that the best action it could take was for each member of the Council to write to the Wickham Market Post Master saying how worthwhile it is to have a local Post Office which is regarded as an essential service which is highly valued by the local community.

#### Standing down

After a great deal of consideration I have decided not to seek re-election to the Parish Council at the elections in May. I have been a Parish Councillor for more years than I care to remember and I think the time has come to make way for new blood.

# News from St Peter & St Paul's Church by Maggie Hallett

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) meet regularly to review the year and plan for the future. At the meeting on January 29<sup>th</sup> the accounts for 2006 were discussed and these will be presented to the Annual meeting of the church on April 16<sup>th</sup>. It was noted that the replacement oak gates for the churchyard should be installed by Easter and this will improve the appearance of the village.

The interior decoration of the church is in a poor state and the PCC hoped that it would be possible to redecorate, unfortunately it seems that when this was last done in the 1960's emulsion paint was used, rather that the limewash or distemper originally used. This means that to redecorate would be very costly, a provisional quote is "more than £15,000", as we have to use a 'breathable' paint which will prove difficult as it may fail to stick to the old emulsion.

The plans for adding a disabled toilet to the Church room have now been approved by Suffolk Coastal. In order to minimise costs a suggestion was made that it may be possible to use an eco-friendly tank system and so avoid the high cost of connecting to the mains sewer. The PCC are going to take advice on this from all sources including other local churches who have experience of installing this type of system.

In order to fund this work we will look into any possible grants but will also be planning to raise as much as we can locally. Many people will remember that for the Queen's Jubilee in June 2003 part of Pettistree's Day of celebration was a very special Songs of Praise service where the top 10 favourite hymns of the village were sung. The PCC plan to canvas the village for the current favourites, and follow up a late afternoon service with a fund raising barbecue in the churchyard. The date chosen for this is Sunday July 8<sup>th</sup> and we hope that as many people as possible will be able to come and join in. Please put the date in your diary and start thinking about your favourite hymns.

Any offers of help and ideas for fund-raising during the year will be very much appreciated as of course will be any suggestions for future uses of the Church room. It is only used four of five times a year at present as we no longer have a Sunday School which was probably the original purpose.

It is worth restating that although the church is kept locked visitors are always welcome. I have a key so please contact me if you would like to see inside and inspect the recently uncovered alcoves. We have a steady trickle of visitors during the year and since the Altar rail kneelers have featured on Radio Suffolk in the Divine Art section I have had calls from art groups wishing to come as well. Later in the year members of the Suffolk Institute of History and Archaeology are visiting the village so we hope to learn even more about the history of the building.

#### **Church services**

We are very lucky that even though we are a very small parish we still have a service every Sunday here in Pettistree. Evensong on the 1st and Morning Prayer on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sundays are traditional services using the Book of Common Prayer, while on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Sundays a printed sheet is used for Communion services which are recognisably traditionally based, but using some modern prayer forms and language. Coffee is available after all the morning services. Every other month we hold a special service designed to welcome young families into the church; this will include activities and songs for this age group and so far have been joyful occasions which have drawn families from outside the village as well. The next one will be on March 11<sup>th</sup> at 9.30 am. A great opportunity to meet other families, and the rest of the congregation as well. At Easter there is no Good Friday service in Pettistree but there will be a contemplative style service of readings and prayers in Wick ham Market. Easter Communion is celebrated at 9.30 am in Pettistree for which the church will have been decorated by many volunteer flower arrangers and always looks lovely.

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#### Red Poll News by Rita Smith

In our last Red Poll News, written in April 2005 for Pettistree People, I wrote about Pettistree Leila calving. We were expecting problems, because, not only was she 14 days overdue and seriously fat, but her Australian father, Eurimbla Gladstone (by artificial insemination) was reputed to give big calves. What we didn't expect, and which came as a huge surprise to us, was to have an e-mail on Nov. 17<sup>th</sup> 2006 from Eurimbla Gladstone's breeders in Australia. They had logged onto the Red Poll website, and discovered us in Pettistree! They gave us such a lot of news about their farm, and we are hoping to meet with them when they come to England this June.



We learnt that Gladstone himself has a rich history. His mother Gladys was a Grand Champion at the Sydney Show. Gladys and Gladstone (as an 8 month old calf) were sold to the Chairman of Taronga Park Zoo (Sydney), but the owners regretted having parted with them, and when the occasion arose, they managed to buy them back! Gladys was taken to their farm at Mitta, to retire gracefully, but sadly fell into the river and was swept away, despite valiant attempts to rescue her. The latest news we have of Gladstone – sent at the beginning of January- is that he is alive and well, still on the farm, and was being prepared for the Canberra Royal Show, where there were 100 entries from every Red Poll region

in Australia, despite the massive droughts that the country has been suffering from. What an amazing

thing the world wide web is!

Returning to Pettistree and Leila – the calf that was born to her in April '05 we named Victoria – because of the Australian connection. She is looking really good and we hope to serve her in the Spring. Leila herself is fatter than ever, and Dick was even more worried about her calving this time around. Happily his fears were once again unfounded, and on the 9<sup>th</sup> Jan. this year she dropped a little heifer calf in the yard with all the other cows around her. This time the sire was Gedding Badger. To date she has produced 6 heifer calves and 1 bull. Her first calf by Eurimbla Gladstone Pettistree Ula has grown into an enormous cow weighing over 750kgs. but disappointingly she

lost her first calf at 8 months from no apparent cause.

We have to keep the numbers of cows down, so unfortunately the gentle Suze, who also calved in April '05 was sold together with her lovely heifer Vanessa (sired by Gedding Badger) to a new breeder setting up in Kent. The field where Suze and Vanessa are kept runs parallel to a road, and they have become quite an attraction to people passing by. Another of Leila's daughters, Sheila, was sold with her calf, together with Miss Santa, (born on Christmas day 2002) and her calf, to another new breeder near Kings Lynn in Norfolk.

On Monday 29<sup>th</sup> January Dick had the pleasure of going to Sandringham and briefly meeting with the Queen. The Red Poll Society had decided to present the Queen with 2 Red Poll heifers as a present for her 80<sup>th</sup> Birthday, as she is their long standing Patron. The 2 heifers that were chosen were from farms in Yorkshire and Leicestershire and because Dick had been part of the selection committee he had the privilege of being invited to the presentation ceremony. The heifers will form part of Tony Barratt's herd on the Sandringham Estate, so the Queen will not have to look after them person-





#### Personal Safety Advice whilst out on foot from Suffolk Police

- -Be alert walk with purpose and confidence.
- Plan your route there and back. Avoid short cuts through unlit or deserted areas.
- -Try to walk in groups.
- Let someone know where you are going and your time of return.
- Walk facing the traffic so a car cannot pull up behind you unnoticed.
- If you walk alone regularly or go jogging or cycling, try to vary your route and time and take the routes that you know best.
- Be aware of your surroundings; a personal stereo may prevent you from hearing traffic or somebody approaching behind you.
- Cover up expensive-looking jewellery.
- Do not use mobile phones in open view.
- Carry a personal attack alarm in your hand or on your belt (available from any police station).
- If you are carrying a handbag, keep it close to your body with the clasp inwards.
- Keep your house and car keys in a pocket, not in your bag. Have them ready so that you can get into your house or car quickly.
- If you think you are being followed, cross the street, more than once if necessary; if are certain you are being followed, go to the nearest place where there are people, such as a pub or shop, and call the police.
- If a car stops and the occupant asks for directions, keep your distance.
- If your bag is snatched do not resist but shout for help.
- If you are confronted, use your alarm and run; scream and shout to attract attention.
- Do not hitchhike or accept lifts from strangers.

Always **call 999** in the case of an **emergency** when you need immediate assistance.

# Welcome to Molly and Nellie by Jeff Hallett

People in Pettistree may have noticed a new sound since the Autumn. Sometimes it sounds like a very rusty gate but more usually it is like a foghorn with stomach ache. It does not come very often and is not often repeated. The most common times are about mid morning, late afternoon, and when we come home after being out. Readers brought up in the country or perhaps at the seaside may have recognised it as a donkey braying.

When our 21 year old Shetland Pony died (of Cushing's Disease) at the end of last Summer our Suffolk Punch "Bear" obviously missed her company. We were therefore keen to find a new companion for "Bear" and decided to follow my long-standing interest in having a donkey, especially since they are said to make very good companions for horses and are even used for that in the racing world. We thought it would be an easy matter to find a donkey and give it a good home without much money changing hands. Those days have gone. The donkey sanctuaries have become very well funded and organised and they had none available as a 'rescue donkey'. There are not very many donkeys about and even those used for rides on the beaches are very closely regulated. However we let it be known we were looking for a donkey and very soon a lot of people had helpful suggestions and contacts. We learned a lot very quickly from talking to breeders and reading the information on the excellent donkey websites such as www.donkeybreedsociety.co.uk.

We were told by everyone that you could not have just one donkey. They are very companionable animals and get very upset if left alone. This would have happened if we had only one and then took the horse away to a show or even out for a walk. When upset and lonely they do a lot of calling and although an occasional bray is rather nice, braying all day long would be rather trying.

We also had to choose the sex of the donkeys. We had clear advice that stallions (Jacks) could be difficult and unpredictable. Geldings would have been fine but we decided on mature mares (Jennies) with a possibility of breeding if we get on well. After seeing a few donkeys we bought Molly (14) and Nellie (18) from a very helpful and successful breeder in Norfolk. They could live to 50 so they are not old for donkeys!

We collected them in our horsebox after lowering the fittings from Suffolk Punch height to ensure they would travel comfortably. They settled well in their stable and after vetting, worming and microchipping they have been able to enjoy exclusive use of our field while we wait for "Bear" to come back from training.

Donkeys are the same equidae genus as horses but they are rather different in many ways. They come naturally from the warm dry Mediterranean area so one of the main differences is that their coats are not really waterproof and they need shelter in cold wet weather. They can also do well on much rougher feed than horses and there is a risk of overfeeding illnesses if they get too much good grass, or too many carrots! Donkeys are naturally suspicious of dogs and have even chased our own friendly dogs out of the field.

By getting mature donkeys we have animals that are ready trained in many ways. They walk well with halters so they have already been taken for exercise around the village. They are pretty calm but thank you to those of you in cars for slowing down while passing. Both are friendly but interestingly different. Molly is always very co-operative but Nellie has 'attitude' and is always the leader.

We have only known them in their shaggy winter coats so we are looking forward to seeing them in spring with new sleeker coats and neatly trimmed hooves. We also look forward to finding out how

much they will be happy to do in harness or perhaps even carrying the shopping.

# A National Scandal

Four out of 10 older people admitted to hospital are malnourished on arrival. Patients over the age of 80 admitted to hospital have a five times higher prevalence of malnutrition than those under the age of 50.

Whether their condition goes unnoticed, or untreated, and worsens during their hospital stay is a lottery. Older people and their relatives are left worried and not knowing whether they will be given appropriate food or help with eating it.

The result is that six out of 10 older people are at risk of becoming malnourished, or their situation getting worse, in hospital.

This is extremely serious because patients who receive good nutrition may have shorter hospital stays, fewer post-operative complications and less need for drugs and other interventions.

Despite everyone recognising that there is a problem, it persists. The problem does not need more legislation and more guidance, it needs to be tackled by changes in culture and practice within the NHS.

Until malnutrition in hospitals is ended, the lack of respect for the dignity of older people continues to be a national scandal.

### AGE CONCERN'S SEVEN STEPS TO END MALNUTRITION IN HOSPITALS

First listen to older people, their relatives and carers and act on what they say.

- 2. All ward staff must become 'food aware' and take responsibility for the food needs of older people in hospital.
- 3. Hospital staff must follow their own professional codes and guidance from other bodies.
- 4. Older people must be assessed for the signs or danger of malnourishment on admission and at regular intervals during their stay.
- 5. Introduce 'protected mealtimes' where all nonurgent activity - such as ward and drug rounds, tests, etc. - is not allowed to happen during mealtimes.
- 6. Implement a 'red tray' system that allows all staff to easily recognise those older people who need help with eating at mealtimes. Ensure that it works in practice.
- 7. Use trained volunteers where appropriate to provide additional help and support at mealtimes.
