Parish Council News



The Parish Council has held one meeting, on 26th September, since the previous issue of this newsletter. Our District Councillors, Mr Mike Bond and Mr Jim Bidwell, from Suffolk Coastal both attended. One of the topics they raised was concern over the state of planning to deal with major emergencies in the community. Since then we have had the 'near miss' of flooding on the coast due to the tidal surge and Spring tides on 9th November. Most of Pettistree is well above flood level but we could be affected by other events and need to encourage our district councillors in their support for plans to avoid or recover from major emergencies.

In the last issue of Pettistree People I explained our need for another person on the Parish Council. I am delighted to say that Dr Peter Hayward has agreed to allow his name to be put forward for co-option to the parish Council. We have to hold an election for Parish Councillors every four years but electors only need to hold an actual vote if the number of nominations exceeds the seven members that our size of village requires. If there are too few nominations the Parish Council can co-opt anyone who agrees to serve on the Council up to the maximum number of seven. We do need a full complement of councillors because everyone cannot always attend all meetings, but if we have too few for a "quorum" the work of the council cannot proceed.

Dr Peter Hayward has already spent his working life serving the local community as a General Practitioner based in Wickham Market. He joined Dr Lehman in January 1965 and looked after many of us until his retirement in January 1996 after 31 years in practice. He also worked part-time at the Ipswich Hospital for 20 years in the Department of Rheumatology. He moved into the village with his family in 1985 and since then he has quietly helped with village activities. Having heard of our shortage of councillors he is now willing to help in an official capacity. We look forward to completing the formalities of co-option at our next Parish Council meeting on Monday 19th November.

The appearance of the Village Green has been greatly improved by thorough cleaning of our lovely village sign and maintenance of the wooden seats. The work has been funded by the Parish Council and done with minimum of fuss by Brian Nobbs of Wickham Market. The next job is to repaint the Fisons Trophy sign that has been cleaned but now needs repainting to preserve it.

There is also good news about the worn-out wooden seat at the Church gate beside the Greyhound Pub. The Holland family have offered to provide a new seat to replace it in memory of their parents Gordon and Florence Holland who lived and raised their family Dudley, Rita, Nigel and Janet in Grove Farm. The seat has been ordered but it will take a few months for it to be made and delivered.

We are now getting used to the new wheelie bins for our rubbish and recycling but need some sort of reminder to say which collection day is which. Do not forget to use the glass recycling bin in the Greyhound car park so that we continue to have enough glass to make it worthwhile for the District Council to keep it there.

Finally we hope that the Greyhound Pub has found a new tenant. An informal message from the owners suggests that legal arrangements are being sorted out with a tenant, but we can do little more at present other than to give assurances that the village is keen to have the pub re-opened as a meeting place providing ordinary food and drink.

Ellen and her pony Bow House Tomos (Tom) had been invited to compete at this "international friendly" as a result of successfully competing throughout the year in a number of high profile British Eventing Pony competitions around the country, at Gatcombe Park, Weston Park, Withington Manor and finally the Charles Owen British National Pony Championships at Sansaw Park in June.

Ellen has been riding since the age of 5 and has competed in local competitions for many years. She has only owned Tom for 11 months but says he is the best pony she has ever had and they have worked hard together to build a good partnership. An Evening with Charlie Haylock

On a cold November evening, the village hall was packed. Those present fell into three categories, Suffolk born and bred, 'newcomers' and 'not-so-newcomers' (having lived in Suffolk for 40 years the writer hopefully is accepted as a member of the latter category). We were all looking forward to an evening's entertainment provided by Charlie Haylock: some may have known what to expect but for most of us it was a new experience and what a lively evening it turned out to be.

Joan Peck welcomed Charlie and gave a short introduction. The theme for the evening was the Suffolk dialect and we soon learnt how important Suffolk was in the evolution of the British Isles. Charlie pointed out that in the list of the top 10 British treasures, 3 were found in Suffolk: Sutton Hoo, Mildenhall and Hoxne. Suffolk also has the oldest English dialect. From this point we were treated to a kaleidoscope of interesting facts alongside samples of Suffolk 'humoor'.

Suffolk humour does not rely on speed of delivery and its roots lie in the ability to laugh at life and one-self. We listened to the exploits of Uncle Charlie on his first holiday to Spain, tried to understand the logic of illogically logical and laughed at the obvious – of course there is no B and Q in Ipswich. Do we take note of the saying the early bird catches the worm, or do we opt for the second mouse gets the cheese.

Charlie then introduced us to the English language. We were surprised when we were told not one word in our vocabulary was attributable to the Romans as they latinized the local names. Our language evolved from the Angles and the Saxon invasions borne out by our place names. Charlie explained why the 'g' is pronounced in Burgh but is silent in Aldeburgh. The Saxon 'g' was hard whereas the Angles pronounced it like a 'y'.

In Saxon times Suffolk was the most densely populated part of the country and many churches were built. It is easy to see how the Saxon word saelig, meaning holy, could be misinterpreted using the Angles pronunciation.

The Norman influence meant the population were obliged to have surnames. Before you may have been known by your particular trade but thereafter you had to bear the same surname as your father. As well as from your trade, place names, nicknames and son were used. In Suffolk the pet name for son was 'cock' and around the country other words for son included ett, ott and fitz resulting in names like Peacock, Bennett, Philpott and Fitzrandolph. According to Charlie in Yorkshire 50% of surnames ended in 'son' compared to 10% in Suffolk and only 1% in Cornwall showing the influence of invaders on particular areas.

To be Suffolk born and bred and to be mistaken for an Aussie could be considered nonsense, but we were soon swayed to thinking otherwise by the statistics put forward. More prisoners were transported from Suffolk, Essex and East London than anywhere else in the country. Very few prisoners returned to England, so their dialects obviously had an effect on the language and speech of the developing country. Charlie's extensive knowledge of the regional variations in the delivery of speech amazed us all as he took us round the British Isles.



Charlie rounded the evening off with more Suffolk humour taking us down memory lane to the 1950s illustrating the change in use of words in relation to the current day. From there we headed down the garden to the family four seater and the two seater and the social function of sharing a

privy with the neighbours. We may not all have remembered those days,

the more modern inside/outside with flush version was more familiar. The Shipping Forecast followed and a rousing rendering of the Poachers Revenge. The newsflash of a Hurricane in Basildon brought the evening to a fitting end.

On behalf of those who attended, thank you to Charlie for an excellent evening's entertainment and to the Pettistree Heritage committee members for organizing the event and to all who donated the refreshments.

An Appreciation

Raymond Hayward

19.07.1908 -07.07.2007

Raymond Hayward died in Haughgate House Nursing home on 7 July 2007.

He was the youngest of 8 children. He was born in Ipswich and worked with the Suffolk Iron Foundry moving on to the East Anglian Electricity Supply Company and Barclays Bank. On leaving Barclays he began his long retirement.

He was greatly amused that he drew his pension for more years than he had worked.

While working in Stowmarket he met his wife and they married in January 1935. They remained living in Stowmarket until the death of his wife after 51 years of very happy marriage.

In 1986 when his wife died, he was devastated by his loss and felt the house in Stowmarket was too large. He moved to The Granary at Green Farm, just yards from Peter, Rosie and family.

He remained as independent as ever announcing that he intended to follow his philosophy and look after the family rather than vice versa. As a new challenge he took up cookery and became a skilled cake and jam maker.

This was his practice until September 2006 when his spinal problem became very acute. After a stay in Ipswich hospital and a move to Aldeburgh Community Hospital, he finally became a resident in Haughgate House Nursing Home, Woodbridge. The staff cared for him with sensitivity, kindness and infinite patience and skill.

Anyone familiar with Ray could not fail to be aware of his great faith. He read his Bible daily. Those who knew him had ample evidence of his generosity, whether it was in the form of jam, marmalade, banquet cakes, chocolates or finance. He gave freely and with great pleasure.

During the last 21 years of his life in Pettistree he enjoyed a close and contented relationship with his family. His grand children and great grandchildren provided him with great joy. The memory of Dan and Gramps on the scaffolding painting the house after his move to Pettistree will remain in the family memory.



Filmstar for a Day

(Well, two minutes anyway)



The preparation for this was frantic – not least the finding of quotes, the filling in of application forms (always time consuming and fraught with problems), liaising with local groups and so it goes on.

However, what it also meant was that one poor soul had to be nominated to face the cameras and, you've guessed, it was me. Media training (sounds very posh doesn't it?) at Anglia TV in Norwich was fun though scary, although the other project reps were very supportive.

Radio stations were contacted for interviews to publicise our cause, a huge campaign mounted in the village (you can't have missed the orange banners, posters and flyers) and emails flew back and forth with the TV presenter coming down to film us.

The day arrived on Thursday 22nd November. I was working in school that day with comments like "You look nice today Miss" – does that mean I usually don't? Anxious glances out of the window midmorning as the rain lashed down (lots of outside filming prepared....) but hallelujah the sun came out at lunch-time. The crew of two capitalised on this by doing my interview outside on the bleak field in front of the dilapidated old tennis court.



I tried to remember what to do - keep looking at her forehead as instructed, remember what you want to get across, don't talk with your hands (tough one that) ignore the camera looking straight at you only a couple of feet away..... After a stumble or two, and a quick check on my notes we'd done it!! The children were filmed having tennis coaching in the school gym and some older ones were shown trying to play tennis on the old court. A few quotes from them and a huge shout of "Vote for Us" from the assembled throng and we were done.

Afterwards it felt like a huge weight had been lifted from my shoulders, but there was a great sense of euphoria as well – the TV crew had loved our preparation and ideas and the children had been fantastic. The buzz in the village was testament to the enthusiasm that the Wickham Market Partnership had engendered with this project.

£50 million for Sustrans but only if you vote

Sustrans is the UK's leading sustainable transport charity. It works on practical projects so that people-can choose to travel in ways that benefit their health and the environment.

It is the charity behind the award winning National Cycle Network, Safe Routes to Schools, Bike It, TravelSmart, Active Travel and Liveable Neighbourhoods, all projects that are changing the world one mile at a time.

Connect2 will improve local travel in ways that will benefit people's health and the environment for generations to come. The projects cover cities, towns, villages, the countryside and the coastline. From the grandest bridge to the humblest road crossing, each project is inspirational in design but in keeping with the area's character and the needs of the local community.

It has just been announced that Sustrans Connect2 project is through to the final vote of the Big Lottery Fund's: The People's £50 million contest which will be shown on television in early December. It is one of four projects competing for the single award of £50 million. There is no second prize and the winner will be decided by a public vote in early December.
