### **Parish Council News**

Our meeting on 21<sup>st</sup> February was mentioned briefly in the last newsletter but there was no space to explain the report of our current policing arrangements for Pettistree. We are now looked after by the Safer Neighbourhood Team system. Details and news can be found on the SNT website which is part of the Suffolk Coastal website. In fact Pettistree is not named and we are included with Ufford rather than Wickham Market. The full team is shown on <a href="http://">http://</a>

but our PC is Mark Thompson. He is assisted by Marie Smith as Support Officer. In an emergency always dial 999 but otherwise use the main Suffolk Police number (01473 613500) to contact them.

We have several successful businesses in the village and this inevitably brings large delivery lorries from time to time. These are usually driven with care and consideration but if damage or bad driving is seen it should be reported so that the authorities can follow it up. This is best done by using an HGV Incident Report form available from the Suffolk County Council website under HGV Incident Report. The form can be requested on-line but not downloaded. It is of course essential to note down the name and registration number of the lorry, the date, time and nature of the incident.

We receive anecdotal accounts of speeding traffic on roads around the village. The police explained in our last liaison meeting that they have to have definite reported incidents before they are allowed to set up even temporary speed cameras. A note of date, time and type of vehicle is needed even if the registration number is not included.

If villagers are troubled by other nuisances such as noise or bad road conditions (including mud and floods) it is also essential to record the date, time and nature of the nuisance. If these written details are available the authorities can be contacted direct or the information passed on to your councillors. Without the details it is very difficult to get action taken on any complaints.

I have emphasised the need for written details of incidents because a complaint was made at the Annual parish Meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> May that the Parish Council has not been taking adequate action on the sort of problems described above. Village problems <u>are</u> taken seriously and if response seems slow it is because the facts must be confirmed. All the advice is that informal approaches and discussions should be held with householders, businesses or landowners before formal complaints are made or the authorities involved. If there is a problem – write the details down.

The Parish Council AGM was a brief meeting on 6<sup>th</sup> May. I was re-elected as Chiarman with Maureen Stollery continuing as Vice Chairman. An ordinary Parish Council Meeting followed and we discussed the disturbance from poorly regulated bird scarers and communicating concerns to landowners. It was agreed to repair or replace the notice board near the Green and to meet with County Council officers to try to get the footpath repaired between the A12 off-slip road and Wickham Market.

The Annual Parish Meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> May was poorly attended with only 11 people present including councillors. As explained in the last newsletter this is the chance for anyone to raise any subject they wish to bring to the attention of the village and the Parish Council. (I intend to see if my report can be put on the Pettistree website as it summarizes the last year from the council's point of view.) The two main positive items to report were the success of the re-opening of the Greyhound Pub, and the release of the preliminary report on the Parish Plan survey. The most attractive and best illustrated report was as usual the excellent review of 2007 by our local history recorder Joan Peck.

The Parish Council needs help. We have recently lost the valuable input of Karen Hunter and Henrietta Kay who have resigned as councillors for family reasons, so once again we have two vacancies. We have not yet been able to find a new Parish Clerk and Heather Heelis finishes her notice at the end of May so we shall be going into DIY mode very soon! If you can help as councillor or clerk please contact any councillor listed at the end of this newsletter.

Some excellent events are planned by various village groups for the Summer months so do please support them to help promote communication throughout the village.—-*Jeff Hallett*

### **Parish Plan**

#### **Successes to Celebrate:**

We received 48 completed questionnaires and 136 people contributed towards the results.

97% of people receive and enjoy Pettistree People, the Notice Boards are another well used communication tool for the village.

Keeping our village litter free is important, therefore the annual 'Litter Pick' will continue.

58% of people have used the Village Hall and the majority of these found the facilities good.

The village green and churchyard are well maintained.

#### **Issues for Possible Future Work:**

Planning Permissions may not be advertised well enough, these can be found in Pettistree People, East Anglian Daily Times and outside the individual property.

Speeding traffic in the following locations; Main Road junction by Three Tuns, Presmere Road and Java Road, and The Street.

Improvements to footpaths and the roadside; we need to identify the exact problem places so they may be resolved. Ongoing these issues should be reported to Parish Council members for resolution.

Housing; 64% of people are keen for small housing groups to be developed, however, there was concern over the possible change to the environment this may bring. No large development is wanted.

56% of people think we do not have a Community Police Officer and 36% feel the Police coverage is poor.

The new refuge bin system has helped the village with its wish to recycle more, however there is concern that not all of the village have them. When will they arrive?

An adhoc Good Neighbour Scheme is in operation. Is there a wish to formalise this or are we happy to continue as is.

52% of households would like Mains Gas, 34% would like to be connected to Mains Sewers. This would need to be investigated by a future project group.

The Final Report Summary will be issued to all households once complete.

Please let us know if you agree with the key points brought out of the parish Plan Results. Please feel free to add any comments or additional issues to these sheets and return to a member of the parish Council.

Once we have received your comments we will be compiling the Parish plan.

### Betty Whitfield

#### A Tribute By Alan and Rosemary Whitfield

Aberdeen Betty was brought up in Dun-Scottish accent. She trained as a war came, she joined the WAAF and Force. They married in 1946 in Bury fifty seven years together.

on the move, in the UK and in North She was sociable and glamorous: we balls and dinner parties, wearing lovely She was also sporty and a strong tennis

The family settled in Pettistree when Father left the RAF in 1962. Setting up the White House kennels in 1964 was an obvious move into which they put enormous effort for the rest of their working lives. Betty loved dogs and knew a lot about them. She bred and trained Alsatians and Cavalier King Charles Spaniels – and she was very successful at showing them.

In her spare time, she raised five children. She and Eric made a formidable team and always appeared to be in synch: we found it impossible to play them off against each other. They were honest and hardworking and taught us valuable lessons:

- 1 "there are no short cuts, you get out what you put in" was one of their mottos
- 2 treat everyone as you would expect to be treated
- 3 pocket money wasn't just doled out, it had to be earned: we had rotas for washing up, gardening, dog walking etc.
- 4 if we were ill, they would accept a doctor's note but only if it was signed by at least two doctors.

Never in all that time did we hear a cross word between them, except perhaps during Betty's memorable driving lessons. With Eric attempting to teach her to drive. Their second mistake was having all 5 of us in the car at the time. The car would stop abruptly and we children were "invited" to walk home, while Betty, Eric and car kangarooed off into the distance. She never got the hang of driving. Her lessons ended on an airfield when she and the car met a pile of bricks.

She enjoyed being driven however, preferably at speed in an open car. She loved walking too: long hikes particularly on the Yorkshire Moors and Dales, again at speed. Gardening was another passion which also earned her prizes. Other pleasures included TV, theatre and reading. Gruesome murder mysteries were a favourite - the gorier the better.

Betty was a lady, seldom if ever seen without make up or tidy hair, sprayed with Elnett (industrial strength) to withstand a force 10 gale or 70mph in Alan's Triumph Roadster. She had even ridden pillion on Nick's motor bike when he took her to her hairdresser in Woodbridge when she had missed the bus. An experience which she recalled as being enjoyable.

We remember our childhood with great fondness. Betty had a fine sense of humour and there was a lot of laughter. Perhaps she and Eric were too busy running the kennels to worry about what we got up to. We had freedom and independence - which we sometimes abused: water battles involved not so much

pistols at dawn as buckets down the stairs, sometimes missing their target and once resulting in soaking Betty and her hair do. For years Eric was convinced there was rising damp on the stairs but Betty never let on.

The death of Nick, her younger son, was an awful blow. She did her best to conceal it but it must have affected her deeply. She wasn't demonstrative but she cared about her children.

After Eric died in 2003, Betty battled on at the White House. But in the end it got too much. She spent the last 2 1/2 years of her life at Allonsfield. She enjoyed being there, she relaxed and the staff were brilliant and kind. We're thinking of putting our names down when the time comes.

She had always refused point blank to reveal what she did during the war as she had signed the Official Secrets Act when joining the WAAF, like everyone else in the services. Even Dad died not knowing, but then he didn't pester as we did! We only found out when we were told after her funeral by two jolly good friends of theirs - actually it wasn't that thrilling (not a spy or anything), and anyway we'd already correctly surmised what it was some time back.

She had her favourite TV programmes, she loved David Attenborough's natural history programmes.and 'Top Gear'! Had she had a Freeview set she would also have enjoyed 'Dog Borstal' being about dogs and their gormless owners, also it was shot mostly at Bentwaters but sometimes featured The Thoroughfare in Woodbridge.

We hope and believe that Betty achieved everything she set out to do. We'll miss her.

On Saturday 17th May 13 teams from all over Suffolk competed for the Suffolk Guild of Ringers Mitson Shield for 6 bell striking at Sweffling.

Pettistree has taken part in this prestigious annual event every year since 1988. This year, for the first time, Pettistree won, the first 6 bell tower to win since 1969."

# **Carpet Bowls Triangular Tournament**

Despite the depleted numbers in the Pettistree Carpet Bowls Team, we managed to compete in the Triangular Tournament with Ufford and Dallinghoo, although it was touch and go to get enough players at time. The results of the matches were as follows:

#### 16.12.07 UFFORD v PETTISTREE

Ufford recovered from being 3-1 down with one game drawn to win the 6th and 7th games and square the score at 3-3. If Ufford had gone for another game and achieved a hat trick of victories the result on the night and for the series would have been very different. As it was Pettistree claimed the win on shots for 22-16.

#### 16.01.08 DALLINGHOO v PETTISTREE

The second match in the series saw Dallinghoo record a convincing win over Pettistree by 5 games to 3 and a shots for score of 41-24, very impressive.

#### 06.02.08 DALLINGHOO v UFFORD

Match three produced another home win for Dallinghoo by 5 games to 2 and 46 shots to 27. The figures however do not give a true reflection of the match because at the interval the score was 3-2 to the home team and 26-25 in shots. This begs the question, what was in the excellent refreshments that so inspired the home team and scuppered the visitors? No samples were sent for analysis so we will never know.

#### 28.02.08 PETTISTREE v UFFORD

This contest was a virtual re-run of the first match between these teams, namely three games each and Pettistree claiming victory on shots for 20-15. Close indeed.

#### 06.03.08 UFFORD v DALLINGHOO

This was a vital fixture for the visitors because if they could reproduce their impressive home form on the road they would almost certainly have been series champions, even though they still had to negotiate a trip to Pettistree's difficult playing surface. Ufford by contrast had lost all three matches to date and so a giant killing was on the cards. Ufford raised their game to record victory by 3 games to 1 and two games drawn. Shots to the home team 26-15 showed the margin of victory.

#### 13.03.08 PETTISTREE v DALLINGHOO

Pettistree retained their title as champions by recording a comfortable victory 5 games to 2. As I said earlier it could be argued that the first match turned out to be the decider.

Although Pettistree are series winners again it could be said that having to play on such a difficult surface each week should merit some reward. I doubt the players at Dallinghoo and Ufford would be willing to swap with Pettistree.

I hope all those taking part enjoyed themselves sufficiently to want to do it again next time and who knows we may find others to join in, which would make the organisation a little easier.

# **Bogus Traders**

Community safety series - article 7

#### Play Your Part by watching out for bogus callers

With the warmer weather encouraging doorstep callers onto our streets, residents are being warned to watch out for bogus deals or offers to check services.

Statistics show that spring and summer is when unscrupulous traders or thieves posing as officials tend to target unsuspecting householders, some of whom will be elderly or frail.

Suffolk County Council Trading Standards officers are working with Suffolk police, Neighbourhood Watch, Anglian Water and others across the county to protect people from becoming victims of bogus callers.

You can play your part by keeping watch and reporting any concerns by calling Consumer Direct on 0845404050, or contacting your area Safer Neighbourhood Team on 01473 613 500, or visit www.suffolk.police.uk

Remember Lock Stop Chain Check (the four steps to safety)

LOCK - make sure your back door is locked before you go to the front door

STOP – think 'Are you expecting anyone?'

CHAIN – secure the door chain before opening it

CHECK – ask for and double-check the caller's identity. If you are in any doubt, don't let them in

Tips for dealing with bogus traders

- 1 Don't agree to any work at your doorstep, or let the job start before you have a chance to change your mind
- 2 Does the work really need doing? If so, shop around and get some quotes and personal recommendations before going ahead.

A good trader/builder is always in demand, does not need to chase work by knocking on doors

and will give you time to consider the estimated price. You have a right to cancel any contract signed on the doorstep within seven days. You must be given a cancellation notice with any work. If you are not, the contract is void and no one can force you to pay.

**Did You Know ?** About half of all bogus callers claim to be from utility companies such as 'the water board'. Householders can check their identification card is genuine by calling Anglian Water on Freephone 0800 145 145 (24 hours

# Official Opening of The Greyhound May 3rd
