An Update on PP

In 1995 three people, Tony Franklin, Ann Sayer and Joan Peck, two parish Councillors and the Clerk wanted a way of keeping the whole village informed as to what was happening. After discussion and the fact that Tony was one of the few people with a computer at that time, Pettistree People was born. The first issue, both sides of an A4 sheet of paper, was delivered free to all residents in January 1996. This continued until 2002 whenever Tony had enough material to publish.

In 2002 Maureen and Joan took over as joint editors. Maureen, mainly as the roving reporter cajoling people to write articles and to keep information rolling in. This has continued ever since on a quarterly basis. Now with fifty four issues behind us we have kept a complete set in the village archive and deposited a duplicate set on loan in the Ipswich Record Office under the following reference:-


Thank you so much for the newsletters, deposited at the Ipswich Record Office, as detailed on the enclosed receipt.

The flower girl Alice Trotter wore an ivory silk dress with a green sash, and the pageboy Theo Logan wore sage green silk shorts and an ivory silk tunic.


Carol is now planning future cards to help the continuation of this good cause and would appreciate your further support.

#### THE STORY SO FAR

**PROPS** was set up in February 2011 by Mike Barnes, Tony Franklin & Steve Wassell, to arrange the supply of heating oil, at bulk prices, for the residents of **all** the villages in the **wider** area around Pettistree. In that short time our members have taken delivery of nearly 1/3rd MILLION LITRES of heating oil, at a saving of £24,500\* in just three placements, i.e. February, March & July.(\*on national average prices )

The Principal Benefits can be summed up as follows:-Lower prices & Stabilised deliveries. Less impact on local roads, reduced Carbon Footprint for the area. Everybody pays the same price. No surcharge for small amounts (500 litre min delivery). Less Hassle – we phone round, fix a price & delivery, choose supplier and place your order.

The original intention was just to cover Pettistree, Loudham & Wickham Market, and the immediate neighbouring villages, but it seems that the word got out and we now cover some 30 other villages within a 5 mile radius of the hub of Pettistree.

During this time we have created a page on the Web, <u>www.pettistree.suffolk.gov.uk/PROPS.html</u> and our thanks to the good offices of the Parish council and the sterling efforts of Chris Garner dealing with the technical stuff, Additionally we have also moved on from hand written registration forms to the ability to 'join on line' and also to request oil from the web page, making it easier for both existing members and potential new members alike.

#### **PROPS International??**

Seriously? Well no, not really but we must be getting something right!! for as well as several enquiries from neighbouring regions on <u>'how do we do it'</u> we have also been getting enquiries from other parts of the country e.g. **Mid Wales!!** Where next we wonder?

Mind you some members have finalised their delivery requirements with the supplier from abroad, whilst on holiday, in France, Spain, Crete to name but a few locations.

#### What's behind the GREEN door

We now understand that the oil delivery companies normal carbon footprint will reduce by around 66%, for bulk orders in the PROPS area, so that's a plus for the environment as well.

#### 'CutOff' dates

Currently we place the members request on 6 dates during the year and as a suggestion, we currently say, that as the price is likely to rise after September, the next time you place an order <u>Fill right up for the</u> <u>winter</u>, and then keep your tank topped up to full with 500 litres at each date ( or more if you can) till late Spring/early summer. <u>You don't pay more for 500L!!</u> The next PROPS CutOff date is 13<sup>th</sup> Sept 2011.

#### **The Community Spirit**

PROPS really only works for those who have at least e-mail, but for those who haven't we have a system called E-mail 'Buddy' (friend). We find an existing member, who lives close by the prospective member who doesn't have e-mail, and ask them to receive and place e-mails on their behalf. So far we have 15 members who benefit from this arrangement.

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS FOR "PETTISTREE PEOPLE"

The **Annual Parish Meeting** was held on 24<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall so that anyone in the village could meet their parish councillors and help plan the future of the village and its facilities. Despite the attraction of Mary Chilvers' sausage rolls attendance was at its usual low level, perhaps indicating that everyone is happy with the way things are going! Several reports were given but I gave the Chairman's Report that summarized parish council and village events over the last year. The full report can be found on the Pettistree web site <u>http://www.pettistree.suffolk.gov.uk/</u> under Parish Council but I think my conclusion is worth repeating here.

"Our village, including Loudham forms a very attractive and effective community. There is a good mix of residential and business property with little absentee accommodation. Community activities are varied and well supported and there is little crime or antisocial behaviour. The website and the Pettistree People newsletter rank second to none of their kind. The Parish Council can probably take some credit for all this and it is pleasing that we have been able to recruit new council members to fill gaps and bring fresh blood as others have had to leave us."

One of the main items for discussion was whether the village wanted to celebrate the special events in 2012. It was agreed that the **Queen's Diamond Jubilee** on 5<sup>th</sup> June should be marked and a street party at Stump Street was suggested. Roger and Mary Chilvers will be busy as they are already organizing a **New Year's Eve Party** for the end of this year. The London Olympics give another excuse for a village event and it was agreed that a **Village Sports Day** should be organized. Please watch for details of these and other events in future editions of Pettistree People and be ready to help as well as participate.

Many people will have noticed that the **glass recycling bin** in the Greyhound car park has been changed for two new bins that are a bit more obtrusive. This is because Suffolk Coastal Council is now running its own glass recycling service. It is worth remembering that the Parish Council (not the Greyhound) receives a small sum of money every time the bins are emptied. Therefore do please use these bins for your glass rather than taking it elsewhere.

At our most recent Parish Council meeting on 19<sup>th</sup> July the importance was stressed of not letting dogs run loose outside householders' properties so that they become a road safely hazard or damage livestock. The **Dog Warden** has already been involved in giving guidance on this matter.

Guidance has also been given by the police **Safer Neighbourhood Team** in view of concerns about an increase in minor crimes locally and in surrounding villages. We are reminded to take care to lock our cars and outbuildings as well as ensuring sensible house security. We should also be on our guard for distraction burglaries and should tell the police if there is any hint that a "rave" is being planned on any open spaces, buildings or fields.

As a follow-on from the Annual Parish Meeting the Parish Council will lead an **Open Village Meeting** in the Village Hall on Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> September starting at 7.30 pm. Refreshments will be provided as this will be a community activity. We hope that all village groups will participate and say what they will contribute for the 2012 events. Please keep the evening free and come along with your ideas or just to enjoy a village get-together, especially if you have moved in to the village in the last two or three years.


### PETTISTREE HERITAGE WALKS

Do you know where to find the Great Mount of Pettistree?

Walking has long been promoted as a healthy activity, combining wellbeing and fitness. Never more so than recently as organized 'health walks' have become popular.

The last Community Panel Meeting was held on 12/05/2011. The three priorities set by the general public were as follows;

Priority 1: To reduce instances of Anti Social behaviour and vehicle nuisance in the area of Costcutters, Walnut Tree Avenue, Rendlesham. IP12 2GG.

Priority 2: To publicise and enforce the new parking regulations in Woodbridge town centre IP12 4LP following the implementation of the Woodbridge Traffic Order.

Priority 3: To increase police presence in Wickham Market IP13 0RA centre following a seasonal increase in Anti Social Behaviour, litter and nuisance.

#### ADVICE REGARDING RAVES

Recently a resident of Pettistree called Police to make us aware of a young male who had been enquiring about use of farm land for a camping party of approximately 40 people. The land owner called the SNT for advise and we recommended he refuse.

The SNT had prior knowledge of this person in similar circumstances and were able to stop a party/rave of over two hundred people which was being advertised on Facebook.

### WICKHAM MARKET LIBRARY

#### Leading the way for libraries in Suffolk

Are you under the impression that libraries are saved? Many people are, but in reality, the need for local communities to take on the running of their local library is still very high on Suffolk County Council's agenda – it has to be as they still need to save 30% of their costs over the whole service.



So what is happening to Wickham Market? In the latest round of cabinet discussions our close neighbour has been designated a Key Service Centre (KSC), with four options available to its library service:

- Option 1. A co-located library in shared space, supported with Council Grant and community contributions which could include local fund raising, volunteers and self-service. Taking outreach library services to adjacent villages is likely to be a welcome contribution to reducing costs.
- Option 2. A mobile library service, changed to once a month subject to consultation. This would be the default position in KSCs.
- Option 3. Community outreach, that is, taking library services out to people in their community, or bringing them to a library. This could be the preferred long term option for KSC s.

Option 4. A collection/drop off point.

Clearly it fits option 1 perfectly – but only if a community group takes it on. Step in the Wickham Market Partnership, a charitable company that has a track record of implementing successful community projects and which operates from the other half of the building. Together with interested people in the form of Wickham Market Library Forum there is a strong chance that a real difference can be made, and that our library can develop into a community hub.

Wickham Market has been put forward as one of six pilot schemes in the county, to test the sustainability of being run by a community group, and to 'go live' in April 2012. A Business Plan now needs to be drawn up that identifies all costs and potential savings, staffing levels, volunteer roles and new services to operate in the library space.

This is where you can help. Do you have skills in marketing and communications or with developing services for adults, families and older people? Could you volunteer to help in the operational side of the library once it goes live? Only with the involvement of committed volunteers can we make this work – please do contact me if you can help in any way.

#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2010-2011

The Village Hall continues to be used for various diverse activities for Pettistree & Loudham and the surrounding community. There have been a steady number of bookings throughout the year although the Quilters Club decided to find another venue due to the hall being cold during the winter. The number of party bookings has decreased since the decision was made to limit children/teenagers events to under 12s. However, the Art Club and carpet bowls has ensured a steady income throughout the year. The Committee also arranged a variety of events throughout the year including Quiz Night, Pub Games & Burns' Night and a fun day on the field adjacent to the hall which included archery, giant 4 in a row and table soccer. The event on Dick Smith's field attracted a number of new participants and a family that just happened to pass by.

In addition to this source of income, the Committee received a grant from the Ganzoni Charitable Trust for £500 which will assist with the improvements to the hall in the coming months. The general state of the hall and the problems we have had, particularly throughout the winter has resulted in the loss of some income. The committee is currently seeking funding to replace the floor, insulate the walls and roof which will ensure the hall is in a fit state throughout the year. It is our intention to upgrade the kitchen and then overhaul the crockery and possibly the chairs.

The Committee has worked tirelessly throughout the year to ensure events are staged and the hall and grounds are in a suitable and safe condition for all those who use it. I would like to thank all the Committee Members and other helpers from within the Community that have made this all possible. We would really welcome suggestions as to what we can do this coming year, not only from our regulars but from everybody in the community. The hall is for us all.

### **ART & SPIRITUALITY EXHIBITION**

Hopefully now we have been informed about some of

the artists within our community we can appreciate the time they spend perfecting their work.

#### "Hatch, Match and Despatch"

This is the well-known phrase used to mark the traditional functions of the local Parish Church, the work of the spiritual care of the community tends to be glossed over! Pettistree is a small village so it has been rare during the last 30 years or so for the three traditional services to be asked for within a three month period. This year is turning out to be a very unusual year, two baptisms, two weddings and two funerals between two consecutive editions of Pettistree People.

**<u>'Hatching'</u>** Mike and Sheila Manning's grandchildren Mason and Lani were christened on August 8<sup>th</sup> in a service taken by Rev Margaret Blackall, which was another lovely family occasion to be held in the parish church.

**<u>'Matching'</u>** June 25<sup>th</sup> was the wedding of Rebecca Westrope (of Park Farm, Loudham) and Andrew Greenwell, probably the largest number of guests to any wedding that has ever been held in Pettistree Church, extended for the occasion by a marquee, with the service relayed on a big screen to those guests seated in the marquee. The second wedding was on August 6<sup>th</sup> when Gill Irvine married Neil Dinwiddie

who live in Wickham Market, but nowadays anyone who lives in one of the villages in a joint benefice may marry in either church. Both these weddings although of different size and styles were joyful family occasions which all present will remember for a long time.

**'Despatching'** the funeral of Susan Schurr was held on July 14<sup>th</sup>. Since she and Peter retired from London to make their home in Ufford they have become a very important part of the Pettistree congregation. Her death although not unexpected, has left a gap in our lives, but we do have many happy memories. Susan was always ready to help in any way she could and appreciated village life happily participating in many Pettistree events, and being an enthusiastic member of the Bell-ringers. July 18<sup>th</sup> was the funeral of Sarah Elizabeth Peck (the Halletts' 'Aunt Elizabeth') who had lived in Woodbridge for the last 14 years. She was latterly in a nursing home but until then had regularly attended Pettistree church, and always came to events in the village when possible. Although at a sad time these services give the opportunity for friends and family to come together to give thanks for fulfilled lives, and in sharing reminiscences at the 'funeral tea' can again become happy and long remembered occasions.

The Parish Church is not a 'members only' establishment, and we are there to extend a welcome for everyone at every stage in their life. We are very lucky this summer that retired clergy Rev. Margaret Blackall and Rev Rob Rose have made themselves available to conduct these important services during Rev John Eldridges 3 month sabbatical, John's first service after his break will be the Harvest Festival on October 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Pip writes: 'The registers and papers that once lay in the parish chests of Suffolk villages contain all kinds of items that could so easily have been thrown away or never written at all. The surprises they reveal about the people of Suffolk in past centuries are remarkable.'

FIT VILLAGES




