Parish Council News

There has been "a lot of water under the bridge" since our previous issue of Pettistree People. This has applied to all areas of village life.

We were saddened to be told at our recent Parish Council meeting on 16th September that Elaine Boardley would be unable to continue to serve as both Chair and Member of the Parish Council. Unexpectedly, family and work commitments have become more pressing and they leave too little time for Elaine to attend to Parish Council matters as they become steadily more time consuming. We shall miss Elaine with her accountancy and business expertise as well as knowledge of the village.

We shall now go through the formalities of advertising a vacancy on the Parish Council and then seeing if we shall need to have an election or can co-opt, depending if more than one person shows an interest. Please contact any councillor or our clerk if you would like to know more about what it involves to be on the Parish Council. There are only about 5 meetings a year and although we have had 98 e-mails from suppliers, trade bodies and other councils since our previous meeting on 15th July, our excellent Parish Clerk, Clive Mann, sorts through the mass of e-mails so we only have to concentrate on the most important ones ourselves.

The Fisons village competition sign has been completely refurbished and is once again in position with new paint and lettering. The main village sign was also cleaned in situ and looks much better. John and Pam Barker continue to mow the Green regularly so it looks very attractive, especially now that the new grass in the old lay-by area is established. Unfortunately cars and even lorries have been parking or taking short cuts across the Green. This will cause a lot of damage if it continues into wetter weather when the ground will be softer. Because of this the Parish Council has decided to place short wooden posts around the margin of the Green to discourage vehicles. They will be placed far enough from the road to avoid becoming a safety hazard and we will try to keep the visual impact to a minimum. They will make John's job harder for mowing but we cannot see any alternative.

This is the time of year for hedge cutting but this year the Parish Council has decided that it can no longer be responsible for organizing who wants hedges cut and then collecting the payments. We would welcome someone who could take on this role as an individual and see if Richard Hayward would be prepared to continue to do the cutting. Failing this, property owners will be responsible for making their own arrangements or cutting the hedges themselves to maintain visibility.

War memorials are very topical at the moment with the centenary of the outbreak of WW1 and we are determined to clean up the War Memorial near the churchyard gate. It turns out that a lot of the lettering will need to be cleaned out and re-painted so it has moved on from being a bucket and soft

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brush job. We have to avoid any damage from well-intentioned but incorrect amateur efforts. A professional job is going to cost a few hundred pounds so we are looking into what grants are available.

If you have any comments, worries or suggestions about any of the topics discussed here please let a parish councillor know. As usual, contact details are on the back page of this newsletter.

Our visit to Los Picos

Everyone told us that crossing the Bay of Biscay at the start of our motorhome holiday in Spain and France would be a nightmare (I took my Stugeron with me!), but fortunately they were all wrong.

We had two nights on board , with Pippa in a pet friendly cabin, and the sea was like a millpond; the sun shone and we sat on deck watching the sea go by and calling at the Port of Roscoff. Before leaving I was fascinated to know how the dogs' "toileting" would be organised. In the event there was a designated area on deck with a hose to use when necessary! Pippa was not impressed but eventually "needs must" took over and she had to cope! On arrival in Bilbao we set off west towards Santander but the campsites were huge and full of statics clustered close together, so we drove further to Comillas to a beautiful site on a cliff top with steps down to a lovely sandy beach.

After a couple of days relaxing, we went off to explore Los Picos de Europa. Most awe inspiring mountains—more amazing at every turn. In the valley meadows where we picnicked, were lots of flowers, many of which we had never seen before.

We took a funicular railway ride up through the mountains expecting to come out on high, but were deposited in a valley with still higher peaks all



around us—we didn't take the opportunity to go climbing—it was incredibly hot. That was our excuse anyway!

Then back to Comillas for two more nights before leaving for France via San Sebastian—a beautiful city which we would like to visit properly without the motorhome as parking is impossible. Crossing into France at Irun, we went across country with me map reading! - to Marmande and Bergerac. On the way I took the wrong road out of a small town and, in trying to do a three point turn, Louis reversed onto the grassy verge little realising it hid a ditch and in we went. Disaster! One front wheel was off the ground and as the motorhome is front wheel drive, it could not get itself out. After various people stopped, including a passing ambulance team, an enormous tractor appeared by pure chance. I waved furiously at it and once we had found our tow rope the splendid farmer pulled us out; no harm done.. I was grateful for my French!

Then on to Limoges, where we experienced the noisiest, wettest thunderstorm I think I have been in. I feared we might slip into the river by which we were parked.

We wandered north to Montreuil, the Wine Society, and home bringing with us wonderful memories of Northern Spain, its coast and its mountains and a fair amount of wine, needless to say.

Pettistree Heritage AGM 10th June 2014. Chairman's Report

Firstly I would like to record my thanks to the small band of volunteers that make up our group: Mary Garner for ably managing our finances, Evelyn Whitfield for writing all the notes of our meetings, together with Maureen Stollery and Maggie Hallett as our other committee members. I would also like to record thanks to John Speedman who audits our finances each year; all has to be in order even though we have very few transactions.

The last 12 months have been relatively quiet for our group, though with cataloguing and recording continuing as part of the day to day work. However, it is always a delight when something unusual crops up and at our Heritage AGM June 2013 one of our residents, Clare Signy, produced an old ledger in which were listed the names of several Pettistree farmers of the 19th century. This was well reported in the December 2013 issue of Pettistree People, together with the talk about Suffolk Workhouses by Ray Whitehand.

Earlier this year, Joan Peck decided to stand down as Local History Recorder having served the village for many years in this role. Concurrently with this she felt that the time had come to also retire from holding the village archive, which was a huge responsibility, being housed in her spare bedroom. The Suffolk Record Office has been exceptionally helpful in this, and has now taken the whole collection into its care, complimenting Joan on its condition and orderliness. The cataloguing system set up by Chris Garner means that the records can be 'bolted on' to the Record Office's own system and records tracked easily. It also means that anyone, anywhere, now has access to Pettistree's history. Mary ably assisted with the transition, spending many days with Joan sorting records ready for their journey to Ipswich. The records have been given the title 'The Joan Peck Collection' – a fitting tribute to the work Joan has put into village history over more than two decades.

If you know of anyone who might like to take on the role of Local History Recorder please ask them to get in touch. There are no committee meetings and the role is not too onerous; just an interest in recording current events that go on to be the history of the future. Part of this role is already fulfilled by the reports that go into Pettistree People, copies of which already go to the Record Office.

The future role of our Pettistree Heritage group will now be the focus of discussion between us, as the individual committee members, despite supporting Joan at different times with research and recording, are not in a position to do the historical work that Joan did, due to our own family and voluntary commitments that we already have. Joan's store of personal knowledge was tremendous, although we will have access to the electronic documents that have resided on her computer, as well as the cataloguing system, so we hope this will go some way to helping us answer queries as they arise. However, the archives themselves are now more remote.

We hope to continue with small exhibitions from time to time, as we have the ability to bring records out on loan from the Record Office, and to also continue with annual events celebrating this special county of ours. To this end our talk this year has been booked with the ever popular and very talented Charlie Haylock, on 'The History of Spoken This will take place on Friday 14th English'. November, so do book early to avoid disappointment when you see the advert in Pettistree People.

If anyone would like to join us they would be very welcome – we don't have many meetings a year – or if you would like to get more involved with the local history of our village please let us know. History is fascinating, and finding out about our people and places is very rewarding.

I do have a Neighbourhood Watch email list which I use to circulate relevant local crime updates from the police (I try to weed out the most relevant items) and also to inform residents when things have been reported directly to me, so if you would like to be added to this 'blind copy' list please contact me on the email below. You can of course be removed from the list at any time if you wish. This is a useful tool in the protection of our village.

Finally, if you do see a crime in progress (or believe it to be happening) call 999. If the call is not urgent but you would like to report suspicious vehicles or people then 101 is your option. This should patch you through to Suffolk Police where you can log the details of your concerns. Do ask for a reference number if you want the report followed through.

Church repairs and redecoration update.



We are delighted that fund-raising for the work needed to repair buttresses and remove emulsion from the Nave walls before redecorating with limewash, has been very well-supported by the church congregation and the village generally. This has meant that since launching the appeal in March we have succeeded in raising a very large part of the money needed. We are confident that some fund-raising will continue and so have been able to give a firm commitment to the builders and the work is due to start on September 15th.

The work is scheduled to take 12 weeks and this means that services will be held in the Chancel until Christmas. The work of clearing the main part of the church has already started and all items not required during the autumn will be stored in the Church room.

Gift Weekend $28^{\rm th}$ and $29^{\rm th}$

June Although the weather was not particularly kind, the weekend went well. As always in Pettistree there were a large numbers of volunteers who erected tents, moved tables and chairs, collected and delivered goods, made cakes and teas, arranged flowers, donated raffle and auction prizes and manned the barbecue in the evening. The PCC are extremely grateful to all those who helped, and also to those who braved the inclement weather and came to see the church and view the old records that were obtained from the Suffolk Record Office for display.



On the Saturday there were stalls with donated goods for sale, including some plants generously given by Woods Nurseries, donations were also made by both the Pettistree pubs, and a large number by individuals. Almost £500 was taken by the various stalls, over £100 was raised by donations for tea and coffee and the raffle and auction raise more than £400. At the barbecue in the evening more money was directly donated, as was the case during the Sunday when after a special service the exhibition on the church remained open for the rest of the day. Dick Smith led some intrepid walkers to view some of the orchids he has found on his land and apart from the very heavy shower at one point, this was very much appreciated by all except the dog! It is remarkable that during the weekend more than £3,000 was raised which includes the Gift Aid that can be collected by the church on charitable donations by taxpayers.

Update on Grants

Grants have been given towards the work by several bodies including the Suffolk Historic Churches and Ganzoni Trusts and a full list of these will be given once the accounts are completed. We are in the process of applying for further grant-aid for the restoration and cleaning of the George Ill Coat of Arms. This is the

large framed piece that at present hangs towards the rear of the church and is around 270 years old. We have obtained permission from the diocese for this to be restored, as it has to be removed for the work to be done on the walls. It is unlikely that it has ever been cleaned, and is very dirty, largely from an oily sooty deposit which presumably goes back to the stove and oil lamps that were in the church until electrification in the 1950s. This specialist work will cost in the region of £3,500 depending on the condition of the back, as the conservator was unable to assess this while it is still on the wall. We appreciate that this is a great deal of money for what could be described as non-essential work, but it has been in the church for a very long time and we feel it should not be allowed to deteriorate further.

Thank you, and plans for services

All of us involved with planning the work on the church are very grateful indeed for all the help both practical and financial that has been received during the past few months. We appreciate that while the work is underway there are going to be problems with access to the building and hope that everyone will be prepared to make allowances for this. We will still celebrate Harvest in the church at Evensong on October 5th at 6.30 but this year are asking for donations of money instead of food, to help the work of FIND the Food Bank based in Ipswich that we supported with food donations last year. There will be a brief Act of Remembrance at the War Memorial on November 11th and we should be back in the renovated church in time for the Carol Service on December 21st.

Let there be light!

In fact it would be truer to say "Let there be light **and** air!"

In June the west door of the church was opened for the first time since the bells were restored in 1986. This has been a joy to the bellringers. Not only has it provided wonderful evening light on practice nights it has been possible to have a through flow of air in the warmer months making ringing a much more comfortable pastime. It would not be an exaggeration to say that the ringing room has been transformed. It also enabled people to watch the ringing during the fundraising and gift weekend as well as other times. After the ringing flurry of early summer and the tower outing to Norfolk in June, the ringers have concentrated their efforts in the village. Despite holidays and other commitments there has been a full band for every Sunday service. A number of quarter peals have been sponsored by local people which has enabled the ringers to assist with the fundraising project in the church. If you would like to mark an occasion with bells rung for you this can always be arranged at a time to suit you, just ask Mary.

This is the biggest change to how people register to vote in almost a hundred years but most people on the current register will be transferred automatically to the IER register without having to do anything.

News In Brief

Suffolk Energy Action is a quality scheme, tailored to the needs of residents living in Suffolk. The scheme is designed to help all Suffolk residents save money on their energy bills and encourage the reduction of carbon emissions through energy efficiency improvements like wall insulation and replacement boilers. Suffolk Energy Action will provide free/ subsidised assessments on the energy performance of homes, identify potential improvements, and provide options and advice for funding.

Over the coming months, Suffolk Energy Action representatives will be raising awareness of the scheme in your local community by leafleting households and knocking on doors.
