## St Elizabeth's Hospice fund raising bike ride



On the 2nd July our son Charlie, on far left, and eleven of his friends set off on a bike ride from John O'Groats to Land's End. The boys had all been at school together and should have sat their A levels last year before COVID struck. They have all scattered to different universities this year but had always agreed to get back together to complete this challenge to raise much needed funds for St Elizabeth's Hospice, in memory of one of their teammates mother, who died in 2015.

Buoyed on by 19 year old invincibility, no training and in my sons case a bike he borrowed the day before he left, the 'Bikestreet Boys' set off. The boys had a two man back up team following in a van, us mothers had daily updates via The bikestreet boys mums WhatsApp group, which was highly entertaining and kept us from taking gin intravenously to calm our nerves! On day 4 the boys hit their wall, the highlands with its hills and torrential rain nearly broke them but they dug deep and after 5 days they were back 'in the motherland' (their words). After that they seemed to fly down to Land's End, stopping in campsites and hostels all the way through their journey. Strangers gave them money, one campsite owner donated the fee the boys had paid to stay the night and people from the numerous McDonalds they lunched at on the way donated money to the boys.

On the 15th July, twelve incredibly tired and battered young men rode into Land's End, their target was to raise £7,500 for the hospice and to date, they have raised over £10,000.

## Parish Council Chairman's Report

The Parish Council meeting on 21<sup>st</sup> July was a first for its venue. We were expecting more attendees than usual and were worried that we might have too many wanting to come to the meeting to fit inside the Parish Room to ensure the "social distancing" that we felt was needed because of a surge in Covid cases. The Village Hall was already booked for a regular user. The weather was good, so we decided to meet in the churchyard meadow. This did necessitate some grass mowing beforehand, but an adequate plot was soon strimmed and raked. As you can see from the photographs below, we achieved "social distancing" and a good circle for discussion.





The extra attendees were from BSR Energy who already have experience with similar large projects. Their plans are to erect a large array of solar panels

on land adjacent to the A12, and they wanted to explain to the Parish Council how it would work. There will be general explanation and consultation before they submit a formal planning application, but we do not think at present that a public presentation meeting will be necessary.

An explanatory brochure and feedback form will be sent to all village households, but in brief the scheme is to generate 21 megawatts of electricity which is enough for 5,251 homes and will bring a good saving of CO2 release. It will occupy 55 acres of grade 3 arable land on the Westrope's farm in a triangle between the A12 to the East and Loudham Hall Road to the South. The little-used public footpath No.7 crosses the site and will be preserved for walking access. Screening will be provided by the lie of the land and by suitable tree and hedge planting. The only significant traffic increase will be in the 4 to 6 months that they expect the construction will take. They will be able to feed in directly to the National Grid which passes across the site. They say the planned lifespan of 40 years will allow the land to rest and then be available for agriculture. It is their normal practice to make a donation of £1000 per megawatt of generating capacity for the benefit of the local community.

Later in the meeting we noted that in the next few months William Notcutt Estates plan to carry out topping (heavy pruning) of the trees that run along the side of the road between the B1438 and the plant nursery. William Notcutt has explained that the shelter belt of five rows of trees was planted in the early 1980's and now needs reduction to "National Grid Height" of three metres and removal of dead trees. It was last done 15 or 20 years ago. They now present a risk to the glasshouses and beds immediately behind them. The Forestry Commission has approved the felling application. He expects that the lower growth of the trees and the shrubs will then thicken up, so maintaining the visual screen. Cont page 3



Progress has at last been made with the introduction of a Speed Indicating Device (SID) for the village. Posts have already been put up at the three sites where the SID will be positioned for varying periods. Generous grants have been offered by our District and Count Councillors to pay most of the costs. The SID will show the speed and record the time and speed for further analysis.

It looks as if Walnuts Lane and Rogues Lane will be designated as a "Quiet Lane". This will be explained further if the nomination is successful with the Highways Authority, but in brief small signs will warn drivers and other users that there are likely to be pedestrians, horses, dog-walkers etc. in the road. They do not actually impose a speed or traffic restriction.

As a brief update on the Hopkins Homes development between Chapel Lane and the High Street (B1438) at the edge of Wickham Market, I can say that this is definitely going ahead. Details of the layout and public features are still being discussed but they hope to start building at the end of this year and to have the first residents moving in at the end of 2022. Both Pettistree and Wickham Market Parish Councils agree that the

most sensible plan for the new residents will be to move the parish boundaries to enclose just the new development in Wickham Market, where they will naturally target all their services and facilities, rather than being in Pettistree as they would be now.

Next year there will be major celebrations for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee marking the 75<sup>th</sup> year of her reign. There will be re-arrangement of Bank Holidays so that a four-day event will be formed from the two Bank Holidays on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> June going on to the Saturday and Sunday. The Parish Council will join with the Church, Pettistree Heritage and the Village Hall Committee to plan celebratory events in the village. We hope to hold a village meeting soon to collect ideas for the events and names of people who will help plan and run the events.

Do please do support your Parish Council by attending explanatory meetings and completing questionnaires on the Solar Panel Array, the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and the Quiet Lanes.

## What a difference a year makes

This time last year, it felt that I had all the time in the world. ### Open practices return at last

From the 19<sup>th</sup> May until 21<sup>st</sup> July ringing was by invitation only. Every Wednesday a group of ringers met for about 45 minutes. During these two months we measured the CO<sub>2</sub> levels several times so that we could maximise the ventilation and see whether our ringing time could be extended. All this time each ringer rang only one bell and social distancing was strictly observed, as was mask wearing.

On Sunday July 25<sup>th</sup> we rang six bells for service, the first time since March 2020. It was a wonderful feeling and the sound of six seems so much brighter than five. The following Wednesday (July 28<sup>th</sup>) an invited band rang from 6.30pm. The ringing chamber stood empty for half an hour when they had finished and then we had our first open practice since March 2020. It was slightly nerve-racking wondering whether enough people would come, but they did. The churchyard was buzzing from 7.45pm. We practised for about an hour, people using different bells, ringing all six.

We still ring masked, ensure that we sanitise our hands between rings, but even so this feels great after so long.

Last Saturday, August 8th, we held our Christmas Dinner (usually held in February). To be fair we held a *Not the Dinner* social over Zoom back in February. We then fixed an early July date to meet in person but had to postpone. However last Saturday evening twenty six of us gathered at the Greyhound. It was a lovely occasion and so good to see everyone together again.

Particular thanks go to Dave Caudwell who started work early in the morning to thin and trim the hedging around the grave plots, this was an enormous task. Others of the group later cleared the trimmings to the bonfire heap, the size of which now demonstrates the amount of work that was done. On the South side of the church more close work was completed to tidy around the older graves and the cremation plots so that the whole area is very much improved.

DC/21/3028/FUL Erection of single storey extension, Sandpit House, Loudham Hall Lane- no objection DC/21/2387/EIA Proposed 21 MWp solar farm on land west of Sandpit House—no objection Appeal against refusal of two light industrial units in Presmere Road, was dismissed on 5th May.
